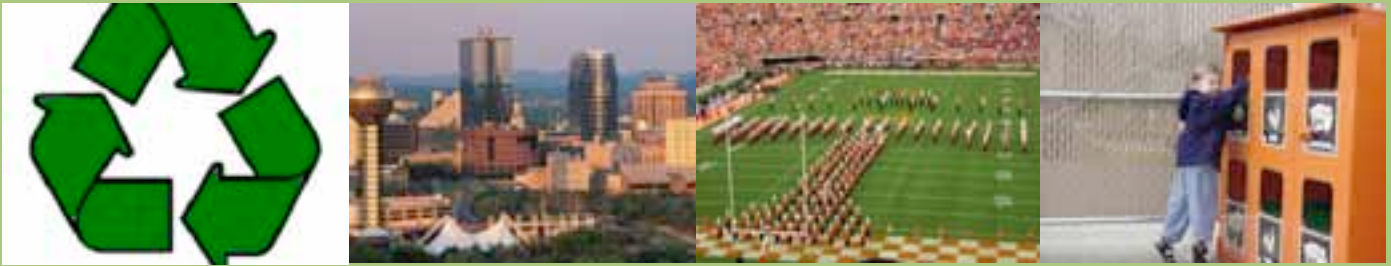

Where to take common and not-so-common items for recycling

Recycling in Knox County

Are you confused which household items are recyclable and where you can take them? The folks at www.knoxnews.com published a helpful list to clear up some of the confusion.

What Can Be Recycled
Plastics with a recycling symbol labeled from No.1 - No.7
Plastic bottles for water, soft drinks, mouthwash, milk, juice, shampoo, dish and laundry detergents
Plastic grocery bags
Plastic wrap used to package such things as toilets paper and paper towels
Storage bags
Yogurt containers
Plastic medicine bottles
Clamshell plastic takeout containers
Cereal box liners
Household garbage bags
Dry cleaning bags

What Can Be Recycled
Plastic container lids
Aluminum cans
Steel cans
Mixed paper - phone books, catalogs, magazines, note pad paper, stationary, sticky notes, envelopes with or without plastic windows, manila folders, paper bags, cereal boxes, books, etc.
Clear, brown, green glass
Flattened cardboard
Newspapers (including inserts)
Household batteries (lithium, ni-clad, and rechargeable only)

Recycling in Knox County

What Can't Be Recycled

Narrow-neck plastic containers, such as pesticides, motor oil or antifreeze bottles

Window glass, broken windshield, light bulbs or any type of porcelain or crystal

Carbon paper

Wire on spiral notebooks

Hard to Recycle Items

City of Knoxville Solid Waste Management Facility at the corner of Elm and W. Baxter Ave. accepts the following:

Computers (up to 2 personal computers per resident, a small fee applies to businesses)

Adhesives

Air Conditioning refrigerants

Automotive oil and fuel additives, fuel injection cleaners, starter fluids

Grease and rust solvents

Batteries

Drain openers

Fluorescent tubes and bulbs

Paint, paint thinners, and removers

The Food City locations accept aluminum cans, mixed paper, newspaper and No.1&2 plastics
